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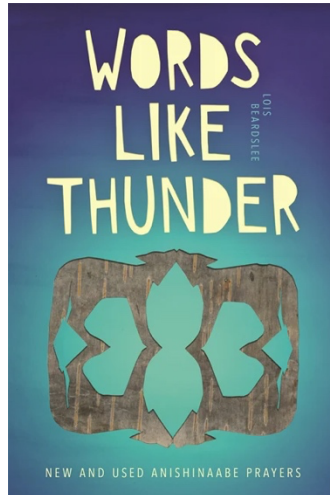


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Editor's Preface to Celebrating Indigenous Authors: Reviews Issue

In this issue we are celebrating the work of Indigenous authors. The four pieces featured provide reviews of an illustrated book, an academic monograph, a novel, and poetry. In the spirit of opening up what form a book review can take, we invited contributions to think of the book review broadly conceived, in whatever form of engagement that made sense to them. The books reviewed were selected by reviewers who felt excited by the words in each of these texts and are not intended to be representative of the plethora of Indigenous publications.
